League of Women Voters Henderson County Program on the National Popular Vote

The League of Women Voters of Henderson County and AAUW Hendersonville Branch will host a virtual program on the National Popular Vote on March 22nd at 6:30 pm. The National Popular Vote (NPV) is a bipartisan effort supported by the League of Women Voters, Common Cause, and other organizations committed to ensuring that the presidential candidate who receives the largest number of popular votes across the country will become president. The NPV preserves the Electoral College, state control of elections, and the power of the states to control how the president is elected. The NPV ensures that every vote counts equally and that every state will receive attention from the candidates. So far the bill has been adopted by 15 states and has passed one chamber in North Carolina.

Eileen Reavey, National Grassroots Director of the National Popular Vote, will be the guest presenter. Co-sponsors of the program along with LWVHC are LWV Asheville-Buncombe, AAUW, Carolina Jews for Justice, Interfaith Initiative for Social Justice, DemocracyNC, Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Hendersonville, and El Centro. The event is free and open to the public. LWVHC celebrates Diversity, Equity and Inclusion by welcoming all members of our community. AAUW – HENDERSONVILLE BRANCH GENERAL MEETING MINUTES FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 12, 2021 (via ZOOM)

The meeting was called to order by Co-President Norma Treadwell at 10:05 a.m.

Cathy Veal, Vice President for Programs, introduced the speaker, Carrie Ann Chandler from *Start Smart*, a non-profit located here in Hendersonville. Carrie Ann and her team of all women (all with Masters' degrees) work to prepare children for entering school by developing their reading skills. Through a combination of grants, federal funds and the United Way, their organization arranges for books to be sent to children's homes at the appropriate reading level each month. These books are retained by the recipients. *Start Smart* also places extra books in physicians' offices to encourage children to read.

In cooperation with other local agencies, **Start Smart** will direct families to get assistance they may need. Carrie Ann described volunteer activities that can be done from home (placing labels in books) or via ZOOM (reading aloud). They would like to do a fundraiser in the future. Used children's books in good condition are welcome donations, too. The program was well received,

Following the presentation, several things were discussed with the members attending.

National dues will increase by \$3.00 beginning with Fiscal Year 2022-2023; For the next two fiscal years dues will increase again by \$5.00 each year.

There will be a national vote on the issue of changing membership requirements to allow non-degreed individuals to join. This will be an online vote between 4/7/2021 and 5/17/2021. While this was voted on previously and rejected, National feels that in the interest of inclusion and equity (also for obtaining Federal grants) it is time for a change (see the AAUW website for more information.)

Our branch has agreed to co-sponsor and publicize a discussion lead by the League of Women Voters regarding the National Popular Vote (Sandi Lancaster is coordinating this.)

Susan Murphy will be moving to be closer to family in about 3 months – a drive-by farewell is being planned.

Mary Ann Bents has offered to do one-on-one training for any member who is not comfortable using ZOOM and therefore is being "left out" of our limited interactions. An invitation will be in the next newsletter.

The NC. State Conference will be virtual this year and will be a Friday evening and Saturday morning event (3/19 - 3/20/2021). Registration should be open by March 1, 2021 (see State website for more information).

The meeting was adjourned at 11:15 a.m.

Public Policy Committee Report

At our meeting via Zoom on 2-23-21, we reviewed recent information on a variety of subjects. Concern was expressed about students who are absent from our school system and the difficulty providing education for them. There may be a place for AAUW members to provide some tutoring as the pandemic comes under control, and we can assist the school system. This issue requires more investigating.

Early childhood education is important and should be funded by our Legislators.

Dr. Margie Maddox, Chair AAUWNC Public Policy Committee, provided us a list of what AAUWNC supports, and we expressed interest in knowing more and writing our legislators in order to see change.

We consider the expansion of Medicaid in North Carolina as necessary to further extend the availability of people to health care.

The Paycheck Fairness Act is supported by AAUW and needs our support to pass. We are all encouraged to write of NC Legislators to support this issue.

We will monitor and work with other organizations on North Carolina's redistricting issues and the matter of voter suppression in NC. AAUW members are invited to join us as we move forward.

Proposed Membership Requirement Change

This spring AAUW members will vote on proposed changes recommended by the AAUW Board of Directors and AAUW Governance Committee that would eliminate the degree requirement for membership. All comments or proposed changes submitted during the comment period, which ended February 7, will be reviewed by AAUW's staff and the AAUW Governance Committee. Debate on open membership will take place in national town halls and state and branch meetings this spring. **Voting will begin April 7.**

Rationale (from AAUW website)

"AAUW's mission is to advance gender equity, yet the requirement for membership explicitly denies access to membership to those without college degrees. AAUW does not promote equity for all women and girls if the organization maintains exclusionary membership requirements. The membership requirement is not fair, is not right, and is not equity. This is simply the right thing to do."

XIX by Jacqueline Lawton



Saturday, March 20, 2021 10:30 am – noon

Dramatic reading and discussion of XIX

XIX is a play about the role of Black women in the suffrage movement that led to the 19th amendment; written by Jacqueline E. Lawton, faculty member in the Department of Dramatic Art, UNC-Chapel Hill

Synopsis of the Play

In 1920, while many in North Carolina favored granting women the right to vote, there was fear the 19th Amendment would open the doors to greater rights for the state's Black citizens.

Set in Raleigh, North Carolina, XIX follows Adelaide, a black suffragette and newlywed into the wealthy, white Germaine family. With access to the political and social elite of Raleigh, Adelaide plans to use her position for the betterment of the black community. She recruits her best friend, Florence, to enlist black women in the fight for suffrage as states across the country ratify the 19th amendment. On the night of North Carolina's historic (and unsuccessful) vote, Adelaide learns that her sister - and mother-in-law have been working quietly to undermine her efforts. In the aftermath of this betrayal, Adelaide must choose between her marriage and her activism. Jacqueline E. Lawton's socio-political drama focuses our attention on the women of an early twentieth-century multi-racial family as they navigate the fight for equality, the compromises of coalition building, and the limits of "family" love across racial and class divides.

In Memorium

We have been advised of the lost of two long-time members since the end of the year:

Ruth Bird was a trailblazer, a woman before her time who worked for some 33 years as a nurse while she was also a mother and wife. Not many women in those days were able to do that, as they were expected to get married when they graduated and raise children, thus aborting any career aspirations. She joined the AAUW in 1947 after she received her Masters' degree and was a member for 73 years. She has been an Honorary Life member since 1997. Not may current AAUW members may remember Ruth, as she left Hendersonville 9 years ago, but there aren't many of us who can conceive what obstacles there were to overcome in order to juggle achieving an advanced degree and maintaining a professional career and a family that long ago.

Ruth was a very modest, busy person who, while she lived in Henderson-ville, led a full life volunteering at Pardee Memorial Hospital, as a Four Seasons Home Care Registered Nurse, at Camp Kanuga in the summer, and in a chiropractic clinic. She was involved in church activities most of her life, active in the altar guild of her previous church and a member of the choir at St James Church, where she also was an enthusiastic hand bell ringer.

She managed to find time to travel with her husband, attend music and theatre performances, and host families of foreign students. She left Henderson-ville in 2013 and moved to Minnesota to be near her family. Ruth continued to be involved in the activities where she lived until the end of her life. She was a member of AAUW Hendersonville Special Interest Music Group and was in charge of making arrangements for and supervising the set-up of general meetings. Continually active and doing, seeming inexhaustible, Ruth Bird stands as a role model to us all. (Prepared by Mary Scott)

Sibyl Lange graduated from Mount Holyoke College and received her Masters in Education from the University of Virginia. She was a teacher and also served as an accountant with H&R Block for 20 years. She and husband of 57 years, Jack, ran large cattle farms in Virginia and travelled internationally.

Sibyl was committed to helping people. In addition to raising five children, she was a scout leader and foreign student host to dozens of students. She was active in AAUW and served as Hendersonville Branch president from 2000-2002. She also supported her alumnae association. Community service included St. Johns in the Wilderness altar guild, the Book Exchange, Four Seasons Hospice, and Habitat for Humanity. As her legacy, she leaves her extensive family, beloved friends, and foreign students from around the world. Yet another pioneering woman, Sibyl was not to be denied the ability to live a full and complete life, successfully blending the desire to use her intellect while in service to her family and her community.
