We've all had the privilege and blessing of standing on the shoulders of women who came before us. We've benefitted from their courage, ingenuity, strength and wisdom. Let me tell you about some of my AAUW 'Sheros.'

Our 1979 State AAUW convention in Jamestown, NY featured a theme of "Action for Equity...Marching into the 80's." There, while attending a local Catholic church, our member Karen Ladley was denied communion because AAUW supported choice. When she told her story on the convention floor later, the delegates rose up and strengthened their support of our choice policy. Karen taught us to march.

In 1983, Marcia Dugan, a member of my NY State Board began losing her hearing and by the end of my term had lost it completely. Our board and branches increa sed our efforts to make our AAUW meetings accessible in every way. Marcia taught us sensitivity and inclusion.

Fannye Belle Evans, Ph.D. came into my life in 1997 by accepting the newly created AAUW Board position of Director of Leadership Development. She and many other women of color helped AAUW begin to truly understand discrimination, racism and cultural differences. They taught us how to listen.

And finally, there was Wilma Mankiller, first female Chief of the Cherokee Nation and winner of the 1993 AAUW Achievement Award. It's hard to put her teaching in words. She taught kindness, quiet strength, the power of community development and curiosity. She taught us to break barriers. This is just a sampling of AAUW women who have not only touched lives -- they've changed lives!

After 22 years in the newspaper business, Birge became Executive Director of the United Way of Henderson County in 2009, a position she held until March of 2015. In 2016, she was honored with a lifetime membership into the North Carolina Press Association due to her distinguished service in the field of journalism and newspaper publishing.



**Barbara Volk** has served on the City Council since 1989. She is originally from Chicago and moved to Hendersonville in 1975. She is a professional registered parliamentarian and before retirement was self-employed providing computer services for small businesses and nonprofits. She is the first female mayor serving the City and has served as Mayor since December 2009.



MaryShell Zaffino, MD, serves as Chief Medical Officer (CMO) of Blue Ridge Health. She previously served as the Medical Director of BRH — Chimney Rock Road before being promoted to Assistant CMO in February 2017. Dr. Zaffino moved to WNC to complete her Family Medicine Residency with the MAHEC Family Medicine Residency Program in Asheville. She has special interests in prenatal care, rural medicine, and migrant health, and previously served as the Board Chair for the Western Carolina Medical Society Board of Directors.

teacher, principal, and assistant superintendent for high schools in Charlotte-Mecklenburg, she has stayed busy working on special projects and has still enjoyed being retired!

Currently Diana is being trained as a Docent at the Polk County Historical Foundation, to serve as a provider of information to those learning about the history of their region in Columbus, North Carolina, where she recently moved.



Cathy is an active member of the AAUW and volunteers for her past employers, Illinois Mathematics and Science Academy and North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics both of which develop girls who become accomplished professionals in STEM and other fields.
