I was mulling over the content for this month's branch newsletter when I came across a comment, directed to me in an email from President Sandy Bernard. In it she said, "Reminder that we had 24 + or -people for September, October and December (general meetings) — almost 50% of our members. And although the turnout for January was smaller, it was an excellent program. Every organization in the country is seeing a slow return to inperson meetings. I think 50% is very good."

There may be inconvenience. There may be some legitimate risk. It may not seem as spontaneous as

it once did to get dressed, jump in the car, and drive out someplace. You may now be a resident in an all-inclusive community that provides on campus activities; or you may just feel quite comfy at home. Aging happens when the spirit of adventure dies, when curiosity lags, when any degree of risk is just too much. This year's program chair, Carol Walters, has spent all kinds of effort to provide programs that are both enlightening and relevant. She is putting herself out there every time she finds a speaker and plans a program. She is trusting that this is what you, the members, want.

It was less than one year ago, in April 2022, that we gathered for a Special Meeting to vote on disbanding our branch. The motion was defeated by a margin of 2 - 1. A small group of individual members stepped up to take on a rebuilding effort, and to some degree it has been successful. Is this still what we want? That is the question we are answering, month to month, with our presence.
