# AAUW 96th NC State Annual Meeting: "Step Up and Embrace Change"

That's the message from Malinda Gaul, AAUW National Board Vice-Chair during her keynote address. There were two plenaries- a business session and keynoter Malinda Gaul. There were also three breakout sessions. Debbie Cope attended Public Policy and Mary Ann Bents and Sandy Bernard attended Growing Volunteerism. Here are their notes:

#### **Debbie Cope** My first state meeting.

Very impressed with Pat Ashe's organizational skills and that she kept the business meeting to only what was pertinent.

Breakout session with Dr. Katie Pinscura and Rob Schofield. Excellent program, although the topics covered were fast One big announcement - we got the word before it was publicly announced: NC Policy Watch was started almost 20 years ago, succeeding the NC Justice Center, and now, on April 3rd, it will have a new name and a new website. The name will be NC Newsline, still working with local news and the Asheville Watch Dog organization.

Many items were discussed briefly: gerrymandering, medical marijuana, parents' bill of rights, handgun check, Medicaid expansion (it may have passed, but nothing will happen until it is funded), expansion of school vouchers (some want every school a voucher school, i.e. statefunded segregated schools). Right now unaffiliated voters are the largest voting group in the state. State senate has 30 republicans and 20 democrats, and the house has 71 republicans and 49 democrats. (It takes 72 votes to overide a veto). Interesting note: NC is the ONLY state to return to partisan judge elections. Mentioned Drs leaving the state due to abortion issues and troubles getting med students and interns/residents here for training. How can we make a difference? A concerted effort is better than small groups operating independently.

#### **Mary Ann Bents**

Fourteen of the AAUW NC 16 branches were represented at the Annual meeting Zoom sessions. There were almost 50 participants including our special guests and speakers. It was refreshing to hear that some of the other branches are struggling with similar issues. Some branches have been creative in trying to address them

and to continuously improve. The online breakout sessions were new this year. It provided an opportunity in smaller groups to share thoughts and ideas. I thought this was very productive use of time. The Keynote Speaker's message was wonderful. Very simple and to the point. She was very knowledgeable and responded to varied questions after her speech about general AAUW National operations and plans for improvement.

I participated in the Branch Leadership Succession breakout session. Sandy was also there to help facilitate this session and to take notes. Participants were respectful and gracious about giving time to each other to share. Ideas were very constructive. Some ideas like varying meeting times and breaking down volunteer roles into smaller tasks seemed reasonable and more apt to have members willing to support. Recognizing all volunteers was a great message; people behind the scenes often do not get the thank yous that they deserve. Everyone's contributions in branches are important. Establishing partnerships in the community is also important; the branches do not need to take full responsibility for events and projects; organizations often have missions that are shared. We need to get creative about doing our branch business in a different way. Try new things.

#### Sandy Bernard

In a recent poll of branches across the country, 89% have mission-based programs, 67% have fundraisers, 66% conduct grassroots advocacy work (and of that, 40% focus on STEM), and 33% support the National College Conference for Women Student Leaders (commonly called nicwhistle). Volunteerism is at a 30 year high (23%) in the U.S. Of that 23%, 72% volunteer for only one entity.

People volunteer because they need and/or want: solidarity, connections, a new social network, credibility, friendships, enrichment, increased networking ability, to be part of a legacy and because they feel happier.

However, it is in the workplace that we have the most chance of rationally organizing fair and ethical opportunities that meet a commitment to the principles of DEI. An example of how to build a more inclusive workplace is presented.

If you think your knowledge might not be relevant, note the wide variety of BRCC programs: Business/business training, Culinary and food service; Education – Early childhood education; K-12 teaching Preparation (2+2 AA + BS); Engineering; Healthcare; Human services Graduates should qualify for positions in mental health, child care, family services, social services, rehabilitation, correction, and educational agencies; Horticulture; IT & Computer; Languages: Spanish (12 levels), French (1 level), German (4 levels+), and Interpreter/sign language. Associate degrees are: Associate in Arts, Teacher Preparation, Associate in Engineering, Associate in Science; Associate in Science: Teacher Preparation; Associate in Fine Arts (Theatre), and Associates in Fine Arts (Visual Arts). There are even more programs that may not fit our backgrounds as well, but don't let an exotic or unique background discourage your participation!
